This app will make it easy for you to share your backyard finds and be entered to win awesome prizes!

What is iNaturalist?

iNaturalist is a free app and online community where you can share your nature observations with others. It's a great way to identify species, track wildlife, and contribute to scientific research—while you participate in our Space for Nature community.

Why iNaturalist is Great:

It helps you discover nature, identify plants, birds, critters and more with help from the community.

Track Your Finds: Record your observations and contribute to a global database of biodiversity.

Help Science: Every observation you make helps researchers and conservation efforts in our city and around the world.

How to Use iNaturalist and join the Space for Nature online project:

Download the App

-Available on iOS and Android.

Create an Account

-Sign up with your email or through Google/Facebook.

Join our Space for Nature Project <u>here</u> so you can connect with the Space for Nature community and your observations count for the competitions.

Once set up you can begin observing and sharing.

-Capture a clear photo of nature in your backyard flora or fauna

Upload Your Photo

- -Open iNaturalist, tap the "+" sign, and select "Add Observation".
- -Choose the photo you took.

Identify Your Find

-Type in the name of what you saw, or let iNaturalist suggest it for you!

Submit Your Observation

-Hit "Share" to upload and share your observation.

Protecting nature in your backyard this autumn

Observing the changes taking place in your backyard as the days shorten, the temperatures drop, and the leaves fall, helps us see what the critters and birds that we're protecting will need heading towards winter.

Autumn colours are stunning, and nature puts fallen leaves to good use protecting plants,

hiding wildlife, and feeding the soil as they break down.

Instead of blowing your leaves away, run your mower over them. Mulching the leaves lets them settle into the grass, adding nutrients and building healthy soils for your garden to flourish.

If you do need to use a leaf blower, go electric and stick to paths or driveways. Fuel-powered blowers are extremely polluting—some have a carbon footprint 30 times worse than a car. In some places, they're actually a big chunk of total air pollution. Plus, they mess with nesting birds and bugs, stir up all kinds of mold spores and make allergies and asthma worse.

You may also notice an increase in rodents as we move through autumn. This is the time they are leaving their parents nests and looking for new homes. Don't let them settle in and threaten the taonga species in your yard. Get your predator free trap working and check the Predator Free BOP website for for new hints for predator control.
